Depending on the time of the year, you will see people lined up for free tax filing assistance or to apply for jobs at local businesses. A couple of weeks ago there was a line out to the door to apply for a position at Starbucks.

The Eastside Library is a true community hub. It's also open on Monday when the Central Branch is closed. The staff is always welcoming and there's a peaceful outside patio for activities or just relaxing. Venture over to the Eastside branch and experience a special library.

President's Message

I was chatting with a couple of fellow library supporters and the idea of the investment in people's futures that libraries provide came up in our conversation. According to the Early Literacy Foundation, illiteracy and crime are connected. The Department of Justice states, "The link between academic failure and delinquency, violence, and crime is welded to reading failure.

Over 70% of inmates in America's prisons cannot read above a fourth-grade level."

To help support a love of books and reading, the library offers Wiggly Storytime, Reading with Therapy Dogs, Job Help, a Career Online High School, 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten, Adult Literacy Tutoring, and the Orton-Gilliam Reading program for 1st - 4th grade students that can benefit from explicit 1-1 instruction.

Additionally, the library continues to support teens in the community. Teens may join the Teen Advisory Board, sign-up for volunteer opportunities, and participate in the Steam Library Lab and Anime + Manga Club to name a few programs. It's important to have free, positive, interesting opportunities available to this vulnerable age group. All teens are not involved in sports and many may need a way to connect with other like-minded people in a safe environment and to have the librarians as role models.

Your membership in the Friends of the Library helps support programs and the purchase of books for which the city doesn't allocate money. Most of the programs the library offers are dependent on grants the librarians write. Each year the library budget is cut, and as there becomes fewer and fewer places to cut, it will start affecting book acquisitions.

We appreciate your support of this valuable community institution. We also appreciate you communicating to the City Council about how strongly you feel the library should be funded. Even if you are not a constituent of the City Council, you can still advocate for all of those that benefit from the services the library offers.



Book Review: The White Lady, by Jacqueline Winspear

I first met Jacqueline Winspear when she attended Bouchercon,* the World Mystery Convention, held in Las Vegas, Nevada, in 2003. Winspear was introducing her first novel, *Maisie Dobbs*, and after listening to her panel talk, I was hooked as a fan. I have read and loved all of her 20 books. Her latest historical mystery/thriller brings a new heroine to life, Elinor White, and the character and book do not disappoint. Set in 1947 postwar Britain, Elinor becomes involved in the Mackie crime family with its many secrets, but Elinor has secrets of her own that we learn about as the mystery unfolds. Winspear is a master storyteller who writes with a great "sense of place."

*Bouchercon is named after the "distinguished mystery fiction critic, editor and author, Anthony Boucher, and it is held annually in cities across the United States, as well as in Toronto and the U.K." Jacqueline Winspear will be one of the Guests of Honor at the upcoming Bouchercon, which will be held in San Diego (August 30 - September 3, 2023). I have attended four Western Bouchercon's (in 1997, 2003, 2014, and virtually in 2020), and if you are a mystery fan, this is a convention you can't miss.



Another book I am looking forward to reading is: *But Have You Read the Book? 52 Literary Gems That Inspired Our Favorite Films* by Kristen Lopez for Turner Classic Movies.


