We ended up having a chat about how thrilled he was that the library was open more,

how many people depend on it, and that it's a true community center that recently celebrated its 50th anniversary. I felt like I was listening to myself. We laughed about the only downside of parking at the Central Library is that if you're there for longer than 75 minutes you have to pay for parking so he tries to limit himself to an hour long stay.

The word gratitude came to mind when I thought about writing this message. I'm so grateful to work with a wonderful board. Regardless of how much work it is to put on an event, we always look forward to our time together. Our meetings are open to the public and we meet on the third Wednesday of the month at the Eastside Library. (Except in December when we have a holiday celebration.) I'm grateful to the Santa Barbara City Council for allocating money so that Central Library can be open seven days a week. Sunday is a popular day for families and working folks! I love being greeted by the library staff when I walk into the building and how willing they are to help with anything. (Last week, I forgot to reserve the room where we usually meet and there was a computers for the community event going on. The staff guickly rounded up tables and chairs so we could meet out in the courtyard. I am honored to collaborate with Lauren Trujillo, director of the SB Library Foundation, on advocacy for the library.

I am grateful for our Friends of the Library that donate, and participate in events. This allows us to give \$70,000 a year to help support library programs and collections.

Book Review: Good Night Irene, by Luis Alberto Urrea

If you are a fan of historical fiction, you should give *Good Night, Irene* by Luis Alberto Urrea a whirl. Yes, it's about World War II, but it's unique and based on a little-known part of the war service.

The American Red Cross recruited women who drove 2 ½ ton GMC trucks called Clubmobiles with galleys on the back for the coffee machines, doughnut cookers, and record players. With little military training, they followed the American troops in Europe into unbelievable danger, had heartbreaking encounters with soldiers, and harrowing escapes with death that left them with scars and major PTSD. Their purpose was to lift the spirits of the soldiers by serving coffee and doughnuts.

The two main characters, Irene, the author's mother, and Dorothy, are the heart of this story, and are as different as night and day, but the soul of this book is friendship. They called themselves Stretch and Gator but did not like the t



book is friendship. They called themselves Stretch and Gator but did not like the term, Donut Dollies. I found myself laughing at the smarty-pants war banter that probably served as protective armor in the face of overwhelming feelings, and I was moved to tears more than once. After one harrowing battle, one traumatized young soldier told Irene, "It was jail or the army. I should a chose jail."

Urrea is a master storyteller and makes you feel like you are there with the sights, sounds, and smells of the planes, the bombs, the roads, the filth, the freezing cold, and the terror. With this 416-page book, he gives his mother and these brave women a voice and documents their contributions to WWII. It was one of my favorite books of the year.

Author E.B. White on the power of books:

Books hold most of the secrets of the world. most of the thoughts that men and women have had. And when you are reading a book, you and the author are alone together – just the two of you.
